JENNET HANSEN WINS DOE WA WOMEN OF ACHIEVEMENT AWARD



Dr Jennet Hansen has been recognised with the Department of Education WA 2025 Director General's Women of Achievement Award for her long-standing commitment to Aboriginal student success.

For 21 years, she has led the **Sevenoaks FTD** program and coordinated its delivery across six additional schools, supporting 80 students in 2025. The program selects motivated Aboriginal students with strong attendance, solid grades and a clear drive to achieve their goals.

Jennet's leadership continues to open pathways and inspire future success, strengthening opportunities for young people across the region. Her dedication has made a lasting impact on students, families and school communities.



WORLEY MELBOURNE INNOVATION CHALLENGE

Our Follow the Dream students from **Perth, Broome, Derby, Muswellbrook** and **Alice Springs** enjoyed an unforgettable week (8-12 December) in Naarm (Melbourne) for the 2025 Worley STEM Innovation Challenge Camp.

Follow the Dream students came together to experience an incredible opportunity to build new friendships and participate in university and industry environments first-hand.

Based at Ormond College (right beside the University of Melbourne) students began the week with cultural connection activities before heading into a packed schedule that included visits to:

- Werribee Open Range Zoo
- Murrup Barak Centre at the University of Melbourne
- Zenith RBA for a showroom tour and lunch
- MCG Sustainability & Sports Museum

The highlight of the week was the Worley Innovation Challenge, where Worley engineers and staff led hands-on STEM workshops focused on real-world problem-solving. Students rotated through activities such as:

- Drone programming with Red Dirt Robotics
- Oil spill environmental engineering
- Flood-prevention design
- Communication in engineering (Lego systems challenge)

These sessions strengthened teamwork, critical thinking and creativity — skills that will serve students well in their future studies and careers.

The day concluded with recognition of students who demonstrated outstanding leadership and collaboration, followed by a memorable evening at Melbourne SkyDeck and a group dinner along Southbank.

Thank you to our partner Worley, and especially to Belinda Campbell and Shirley Hedland, whose ongoing support and mentorship make this camp possible. Their commitment to empowering young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in STEM continues to inspire the next generation of engineers, scientists and innovators.

To our incredible students — your curiosity, courage and enthusiasm shone all week. We are so proud of you.

And a huge thank you to our incredible Follow the Dream alumni — Emily (Alice Springs) and Wendi (St Mary's Broome), both FTD Coordinators, and Skye and Kaylyn who are tutors at Muswellbrook FTD for the enormous effort that goes into making this camp such a success each year.



BRIDGESTONE 'TORQUE TALKS' PHYSICS CHALLENGE

Bridgestone Mining Solutions Australia recently welcomed 16 students from **Geelong FTD program (Northern Bay College and Western Heights College)** to its Melbourne branch for an exciting and interactive Bridgestone 'Torque Talks' Physics Challenge.

Led by mathematician and comedian Simon Pampena alongside Simon Galbraith, Senior Specialist Tyre Services, students explored the science behind mass, force and energy — and how these principles apply to Bridgestone's giant OTR tyres. They also gained a behind-the-scenes look at tyre manufacturing, repair and fitting, and learned about different tyre types, grip patterns and real-world applications.

FORGOTTEN ANZACS HONOURED

Students from the **Mt Lawley FTD - Jinjeejerup Outreach** program proudly took part in the Forgotten Aboriginal ANZAC project, honouring nine Aboriginal soldiers who served Australia but were never formally recognised.

Over two years, students researched each soldier's life, located & met with families, and collaborated with the Honour Avenues Group, Kings Park leaders, historians and the Polly Farmer Foundation to ensure every story was carefully and respectfully restored.

During Reconciliation Week, the men were honoured at a special ceremony with plaques in May Circle, attended by their descendants and special guests including Kim Farmer. It was a powerful moment of truth-telling and remembrance.

These Aboriginal soldiers served their country during a time of discrimination, hardship and attempted cultural erasure. Their courage and sacrifice stand as a testament to extraordinary resilience. While the injustices they faced cannot be undone, this project represents an important step toward recognition and healing. Students were immensely proud to help ensure these men were finally acknowledged for their service, integrity and legacy. *Lest we forget.*



CAREERS EXPO COMMUNITY ARTWORK



Rebekah Delaney, a Kamilaroi woman born in Western Sydney, has built an inspiring path grounded in resilience, culture and creativity. After moving to Perth at age 12, she joined the Follow the Dream program at **Kelmscott SHS**, which she credits with helping her stay focused and complete high school with her ATAR. She graduated from **Sevenoaks Senior College** in 2019.

In honour of her late sister, Rebekah went on to establish her art business, Murriwa Yinarr — meaning Murri Perth Girl. Her work celebrates identity, community and the strength of Aboriginal women.

This year, we were proud to welcome Rebekah to our Careers Expo, where she created a stunning community canvas for the Polly Farmer Foundation. Her artwork beautifully captures the spirit and purpose of the Foundation:

- Polly Farmer appears on the left, kicking a football labelled “EDUCATION” through bright goalposts — symbolising his greatest achievement, not on the field, but in empowering his people through learning.
- At the centre are Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, the heart of the Foundation’s mission.
- Surrounding them are the diverse people who uplift and support students — staff, board members, partners, coordinators and tutors.
- Four pathways extend outward, each connected to a Noongar totem/animal representing the Foundation’s values:
 - Yonga (Kangaroo) – *Opportunity*: Always moving forward, symbolising growth and possibility.
 - Waalitj (Wedge-tailed Eagle) – *Empowerment*: Rising above challenges with strength and vision.
 - Maali (Black Swan) – *Belonging*: Representing identity, community and cultural grounding.
 - Booyi (Turtle) – *Legacy*: Passing knowledge across generations and creating enduring pathways.



A highlights video captured the energy of the day, featuring reflections from students, program coordinators and tutors. Among the standout comments were:

- ... "Uni doesn't seem as scary as it did before."
- ... "We're not in this alone - we're in this together."
- ... "Students now have this incredible sense of confidence and purpose."

Kedala Djinanginy was more than a campus tour — it was an experience that helped students feel their future pathways. Many left with new friendships, fresh aspirations and a strengthened sense of pride and direction.

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

Llewey is enrolled in Law at UWA. His dream is to make a real impact in the legal field.



STUDENT VOICES LEADING THE WAY

In early September, **Mt Lawley FTD - Jinjeejerup Outreach** students and alumni had the opportunity to meet with Jay Peckitt, Director General of Education WA, to share key reflections on their educational journeys.

There is strong hope that Gnalla Kaartdijin, Gnalla Bidee will become an annual event, ensuring student voices continue to guide real change and create leadership aspirations throughout their education journeys.

After completing a Bachelor of Science at the University of Western Australia, she is now preparing to begin postgraduate Medicine — a major step toward her long-held goal of becoming a doctor.

Beyond her academic achievements, Taleah has taken on significant leadership roles, including serving as Women's Officer for the UWA Student Guild and Co-Chair of the Referendum Working Group. She also contributes to important health research as an Aboriginal Research Assistant at the Kids Research Institute Australia, working on projects focused on healthy skin and rheumatic fever prevention.

Taleah's journey demonstrates resilience, determination and the impact of culturally grounded programs like Follow the Dream. Her success highlights the talent and leadership emerging from young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples — and the bright futures they are shaping for their communities.

ALUMNI - ISAIAH MCKENNA

Isaiah McKenna's (**St. Mary's College FTD**) journey since leaving high school has been defined by determination, leadership and a deep commitment to justice and community.

After moving to Perth in 2021 to pursue university studies, Isaiah channelled her passions for education, advocacy and mental health into several influential roles. She has served as an Aboriginal Liaison Officer at Mercedes College and as the Director of Equity and Wellbeing on the Curtin Student Law Society, championing culturally safe and inclusive spaces for students.

Now in her final year of law school at Curtin University, Isaiah works at commercial law firm Clayton Utz, gaining experience across Mergers and Acquisitions and, more recently, ESG and Projects.



Isaiah spent two weeks shadowing Magistrate Kim Farmer at the Children's Court of Western Australia. During her placement, she observed court proceedings across multiple jurisdictions and produced a research paper examining the outcomes of former therapeutic court participants, offering recommendations to better support 12 to 13 year old young people.

Isaiah hopes to combine her legal training with her passion for community empowerment — strengthening legal literacy among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, supporting self-determined outcomes, and increasing First Nations representation across the legal profession.

Her journey is a powerful example of what can be achieved when talent, purpose and opportunity come together.

Khan John's (**Broome FTD**) journey has been a rewarding blend of professional ambition and personal milestones.

In 2023, Khan completed his double degree in Engineering (Honours) and Management at Curtin University. After graduating, he was accepted into the Woodside Energy Graduate Program as a Production Engineer.

During his studies, Khan founded a startup called NOA Tech, which he launched in 2022. Based in Perth, NOA Tech is dedicated to redefining communications through state-of-the-art technology. WORLD INDIGENOUS PEOPLES CONFERENCE ON EDUCATION

This year, PFF alumni joined thousands of Indigenous educators, leaders and young people from around the globe at the World Indigenous Peoples' Conference on Education (WIPCE) — the world's largest gathering dedicated to Indigenous knowledge, culture and educational futures.

Held every three years and most recently hosted in Aotearoa (New Zealand), WIPCE brings together diverse Indigenous nations to share ideas, celebrate culture and strengthen pathways for future generations. The 2025 conference placed a strong emphasis on Youth, recognising the voices and aspirations of emerging Indigenous scholars.

Among those representing Australia were FTD alumni Kathleen and Marleigh, whose abstract was selected from thousands of submissions worldwide. Their presentation, "Dream Big with Purpose: Inspiring Pathways of Self-Determination for Indigenous Australian Youth," highlighted the transformative impact of the Follow the Dream program and the legacy of Polly Farmer's vision. Both now Curtin University graduates, they spoke about how culturally grounded, Indigenous-led programs empower young people to pursue higher education and shape their own futures — aligning strongly with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.



Kath reflected on the experience: "As a FTD alumni from Tom Price and now a university graduate, speaking at a conference of this scale was incredible. Being among global Indigenous leaders and sharing our story is something I'll never forget. I'm so grateful to the PFF for a program we're proud to represent."
